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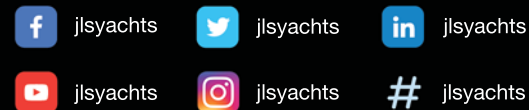

Superyacht Guide to Maldives

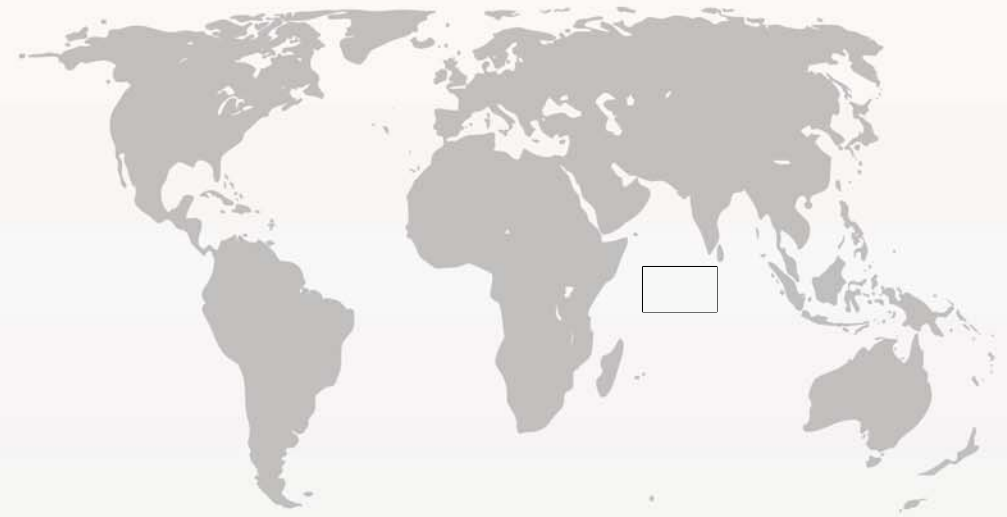


Republic of the Maldives is a sovereign archipelagic nation positioned in the Indian Ocean. Notably the South Asian Island nation has no counterpart in the entire world in terms of its unique geography and topography. The Maldives comprises of 26 natural atolls consisting of dual island chains. Incidentally the Maldivian language has the distinct pleasure of contributing to the English word "atoll", which was derived from the Maldivian word "atholhu".

There are channels of various sizes between the atolls used for navigation. For efficient administrative functioning, the 26 natural atolls are categorised into 20 administrative divisions. Particularly the island nation is located in a strategic area with access to major international sea routes in the Indian Ocean. The Maldives, located on top of a vast underwater mountain range have around 1190 islands and sandbanks. The pearl string like islands covers a land area of no less than 298 km². All the islands are encircled by a lagoon blessed with crystal clear water. These islands are protected by a reef structure, housing one of the most exclusive and spectacular underwater life.

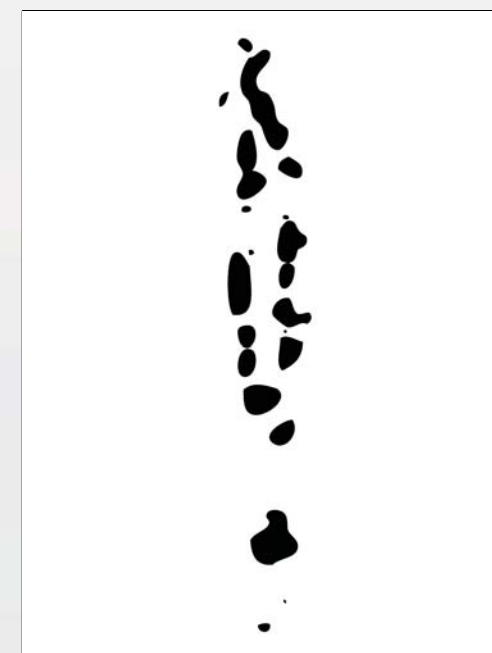

Having fun in the Maldives

The Maldives is unusual as a holiday destination because of the fun things to do whether you are staying on a plush resort, in Male', or in a simple guesthouse on an island in a faraway atoll. Entertainment and daily excursions are organised at every resort so don't be shy about joining in. Excursions will include fishing and cruising (to watch dolphins dance) as well as visits to the capital, Male', and to genuinely deserted islands, perhaps for swimming and a picnic, and shopping expeditions to neighboring inhabited islands.

If you stay in a guesthouse on an inhabited island, you will have the chance to meet Maldivians, experience local culture and cuisine, and join in what the islanders do for relaxation, such as playing football in the late afternoon or relaxing over a soft drink and eating "short eats" (small snacks) in a seaside café.

You will be able to organise fun activities for yourself, like going on a dhoni (local boat) to try your hand at line fishing, or swim in crystal clear lagoons watching marine life through a snorkel.

BEACH COMBING

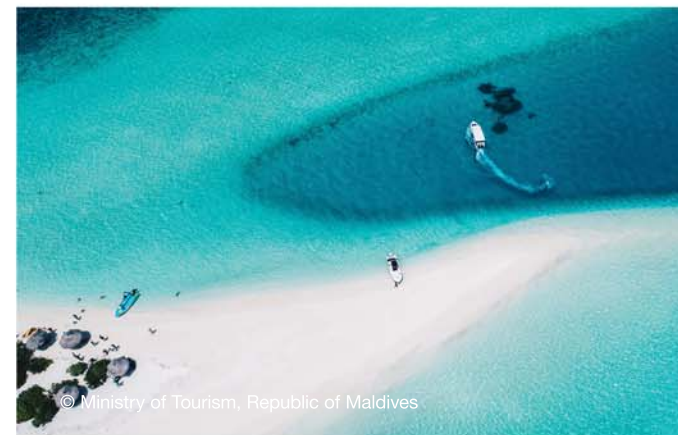
A dawn walk along the beach is not only invigorating exercise, it's also a chance to see what the night's waves have washed up. There will probably be bits of dead coral and shells, but leave those there; empty shells become homes for crabs. It's not unknown to find a bottle with a message in it although to stumble on a pirate treasure chest is unlikely. You will see arrow-shaped footprints of sea birds and perhaps tyre-like trails traced in the sand from the sea's edge. That means a turtle came ashore in the night to lay eggs and its flippers left the tell-tale trail.

COOKING THE MALDIVIAN WAY

Staying in a family-run guesthouse is a wonderful way to learn how to cook Maldivian dishes, as well as to enjoy authentic island cuisine. You'll be surprised how the delicious flavours are conjured out of herbs growing on the island and by the intricate detail of home cooking. The cook will be happy to tell you the recipe so you can try it at home. Some resorts organise weekly cooking demonstrations of Maldivian favourites, letting guests enjoy their own preparations for lunch.

PICNIC ON A SANDBANK & STARGAZING

A sandbank hasn't quite become a fully-fledged island, and it might not even have trees so you'll need parasols for shade, as well as that picnic basket. Sandbank picnics are arranged by resorts that have a sandbank within range and the resort provides everything including a private boat and a butler to serve, who will withdraw discreetly when guests want to be alone.

Island picnics can also be arranged for guests cruising the atolls by LiveAboard safari vessel. With no tall buildings in the way, guests can sit on the beach (or a sandbank for zero light pollution) on a cloudless night and gaze at the stars. Because the islands are close to the Equator, the moon is brighter and the stars more defined and visible in hundreds against the velvet darkness of the sky. With 360 degrees of horizon and minimal artificial light, the Maldives is surely one of the best places in the world for budding astrologers... or for simply wondering what those twinkling stars really are.

DOLPHIN WATCHING & WHALE SUBMARINE

The Maldives is home to 21 species of whale and dolphin and they are frequently sighted as they cross in the channels from one side of an atoll to another. They are sometimes spotted during the crossing from the airport to Male'. Many resorts organise cruises to the sea-lanes that dolphins regularly use, and independent dolphin watching cruises by dhoni can be arranged by the accommodation provider. Operating out of Male' (bookings can be coordinated through your resort) the whale submarine is a chance for young and old to visit the underwater world without getting wet, while enjoying the exciting experience of diving in a real submarine.

The cabin of the submarine is fully air-conditioned and has a normal atmospheric pressure so passengers breathe normal air. The whale submarine has safety features to ensure the safest, most comfortable ride, and is operated by a fully trained and certified team of pilots. It carries enough oxygen, water and food supplies to support all passengers and crew for 100 hours. On most dives passengers can see schools of blue or yellow-striped snappers and common lionfish, yellow box fish and sometimes turtles. Depending on the time of the day, current and many other factors, the submarine may dive to some historical sites such as a shipwreck or exciting places like a shark feeding area. The whole tour takes about three hours and is an amazing experience, especially for children and non-divers.

KIDS' ACTIVITIES AND CRAB RACING

Resorts which welcome young children have kiddies' clubs or play areas devoted to kids' activities, with a trained child minder in charge, so parents can safely leave their kids there while they dive or snorkel.

Resorts also have vetted babysitters to watch over kids while parents dine or disco. Special children's meals and mealtimes are available on request. Resorts are safe for children as they can roam and play quite happily since there are no vehicles, although they should be supervised on the beach or by a swimming pool. Maldivians are fond of children and like making a fuss over visitors' kids. Children of ten and above can enrol to learn snorkelling or diving at the resort's dive centre.

Crab Racing is organised on resorts and at inhabited islands as occasional evening entertainment. The crabs are provided by the organisers who mark out a track in the sand for the racing crustaceans. Guests are invited to participate as walk-along jockeys behind their allocated crab. The first crab to finish the course wins its jockey a prize. It can be fun when you mix with a party-going crowd.

ENTERTAINMENT & SOUVENIR SHOPPING

There are resorts that cater for guests who like to party at night and arrange evening entertainment by visiting bands and DJs. About 50 resorts have purpose-built night clubs for karaoke or DJ entertainment and are equipped to provide a great night's dancing as a change from diving or sunbathing all day.

It's always fascinating to pop into a resort's gift shop, or visit the souvenir shops on an inhabited island. There are locally made items like lacquerware, delicately woven reed mats and items made from plaited dried coconut leaves. Edible local souvenirs are packets of delicious beach almonds, tins of Maldives tuna and sachets of sun-dried fish chips.

Thrills galore

Because of its marine location, the Maldives boasts every kind of water-based adventure sport from paddling around a lagoon in a transparent hulled canoe to being propelled several metres below the surface of the sea by underwater scooter, or gliding several metres above the surface dangling from a parachute behind a speedboat. For the energetic and adventurous, the Maldives is just as rewarding a destination as it is for the laidback sun worshiper or sophisticated epicure.

With 99% of its territory being sea, the Maldives is one of the world's leading watersports hubs with its environment of islands and turquoise blue waters forming the perfect combination for a natural watersports arena. All the resorts and the inhabited islands popular with tourists have a watersports centre of some kind, either with a fleet of windsurf boards, sails and other equipment, or just a couple of wakeboards.

Not all the resorts favour motorised watersports like jet skiing because of the pollution and noise disturbance to the serenity of the resort. On the other hand, many resorts support watersports like canoeing and paddle surfing because of their minimal effect on the peaceful environment. Some of the popular thrills to be had from adventure watersports are listed here.

CANOEING & CATAMARAN SAILING

Canoes can be hired for an energetic paddle around a lagoon from all except about ten resorts. While it might seem simple, it's a demanding form of exercise, especially in the sun. If required a crew member from the watersports centre will act as instructor and escort. Mini catamarans about 5m long consisting of two hulls with a sail in the middle can be hired either with someone from the watersports centre as instructor and crew, or for solo excursions by expert sailors. It's a graceful way to sail around a lagoon and less strenuous than windsurfing.

JET SKI & KAYAKING

Jet skis are a bit like motorbikes as they roar across the water leaving spray and foam in their wake. It's a fun ride clinging to the jet ski's driver or taking over the controls. A kayak is great for paddling in solo exploration around an island as it is made with a light frame and has a watertight covering with a small opening for the paddler. Some kayaks are made of transparent material for gazing underwater.

FREE DIVING & FUN TUBE RIDING

Free diving is genuinely a free activity since no equipment has to be hired. This extreme sport is also known as skin diving. It relies on the diver's ability to hold breath underwater until resurfacing, instead of using traditional breathing apparatus such as scuba gear. It can be a competitive sport in which divers strive to attain great depths, times or distance with a single breath. Free diving is the basis of synchronised swimming and underwater games. Free diving is actually an ancient practice in the Maldives from the days when a boatman would have to dive down to the seabed to untie a rope from the sunken rock to which the boat is moored, or to unhook an anchor caught in a reef. Fishermen would also free dive to hand-catch lobsters. (Spears and harpoons are banned in the Maldives.) Free diving is also a recreational activity; it's relaxing and liberating because of the freedom experienced underwater, and the lack of restricting equipment or noise. Expert free divers often go as deep as scuba divers but the time spent underwater is limited to their breath-holding ability. The Maldives lagoons are good places to practise swimming underwater on a single breath and to try free diving. However, it is advisable for beginners first to seek advice and guidance from the crew at a resort's diving station. Ringo, banana and fun tube riding is a pursuit of young thrill-seekers who are towed on an inflated tube of various shapes behind a speedboat across a lagoon. Sometimes the experience ends with everyone being happily toppled into the water.

FISHING & FLYBOARDING

More than 90 resorts can arrange the thrill of big game fishing for serious anglers. There are three main areas for fishing. The reef waters include outer slopes of reefs and the channels between islands. Bait fish for catching tuna by rod and line can be caught in the reef waters. The intra-atoll basin means the area within atolls, and that's where to find frigate mackerel, sail fish and seer fish. Near-shore waters are the waters outside atolls but within 40km of the coast. Skip jacket tuna is caught there. Fishing in a lagoon is not allowed. Some resorts have boats especially constructed for big game fishing with fixed seats and rod holders for fighting the big ones, and systems for finding fish. Records of game-fish catches are recorded in association with the International Game Fishing Association. Flyboarding is an extreme sport taking water skiing to a new direction: upwards. It's a thrill seeker's dream that enables the participant to shoot up into the air and zoom over the waves. The flyboard itself is strapped to the feet of the user and is connected to a jet ski by a hose. The power of the jet ski emits water through the hose jettisoned out at great pressure beneath the flyboard. This powers it and the flyboarder, supported by the hose, up to about 9m to 10m above the water. The flyboarder controls everything about the flyboard except how much power it's receiving. The power portion of the experience is controlled by a certified instructor on the accompanying jet ski.

KITE SURFING & KNEEBOARDING

This is a surface watersport that combines all the thrills of wakeboarding, windsurfing, paragliding, skateboarding and gymnastics in an extreme sport demanding strength and agility. The kitesurfer harnesses the power of the wind by hanging on to a large, controllable kite that sweeps across the water according to the wind's force. Standard surfboards or boards shaped specifically for the purpose are used. Paddle boarding, or paddle surfing, looks like a simple sea sport until you try it. All you need is a board on which you stand and a paddle, a pole with a broad blade at one end, to steer the board, and you, through the water. The calmer the water (as in a lagoon) the more chance to glide and turn with proficiency. Floating along standing up on a paddle board is a great way to observe what's happening underwater.

PARASAILING & SURFING

Less than a third of resort watersports centres have facilities for parasailing and it is a thrilling, but demanding, watersport. It is just as thrilling to watch, as it resembles surfing while attached to a parachute. The participant is towed behind a boat while harnessed to a specially designed canopy wing, the parasail. As the boat gains speed, the wind catches the parasail and it, and the participant, soar above the waves. The Maldives is famous around the world for its extreme surfing and there are several surfing areas within the atolls, with Male' Atoll being the most convenient because of proximity to the airport and for boat transfers from Male'. Great surfing is possible between April and October when three good swells come each month, lasting a couple of days, and the best thing is that these are off-shore. Waves are commonly 2m high. Some of them are known as Himafushi (Jail Break), Thamburudhoo left and right (aka Honkys and Sultans) Thulusdhoo Point (Colas) and Kuda Vilingili with the best "left hander" in the Atoll. In the far south, Laamu and Gaafu Alifu/Gaafu Dhaalu Atolls (also known as Huvadhu) are separated by the broad One and Half Degree Channel. As there is not much land mass to the south of these atolls, swells generated by the roaring forties (a weather phenomenon created in the far south of the Indian Ocean) hit the islands of these atolls, creating the best waves in the country. A good time to visit Huvadhu Atoll is during the northeast monsoon, January to March, when the swell is most consistent. For waves around Laamu the best times are March to April and August to November.

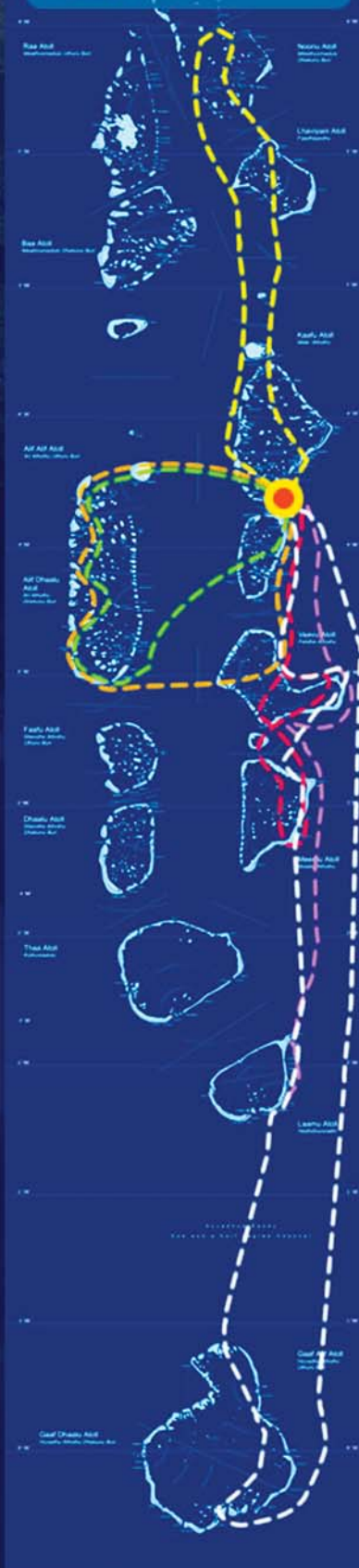

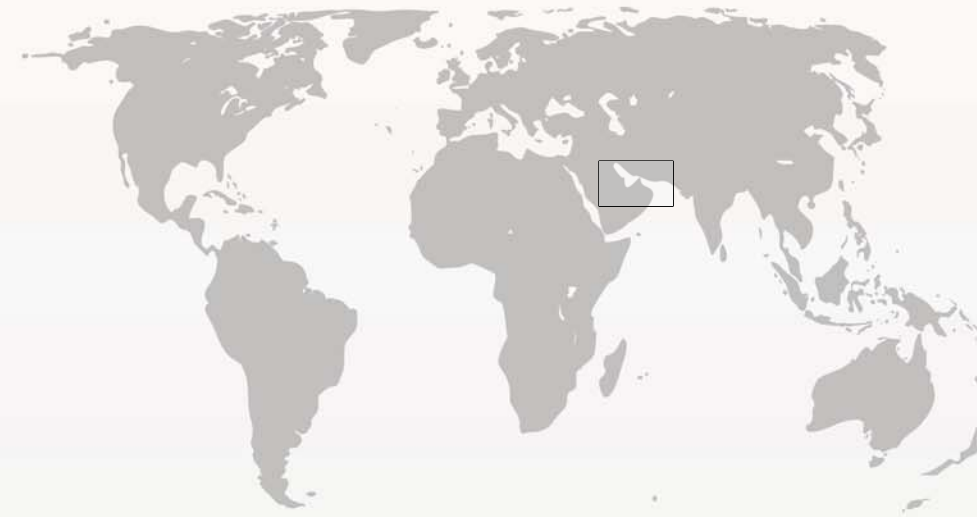

Top Attractions

#indubai

Dubai is a city that must be seen to be believed. Record-breaking architecture stands alongside traditional quarters, while man-made islands jut out of the coastline. Here are the top places to tick off your sightseeing list when you're in town.



The Dubai Fountain

Witness water dance at the iconic Dubai Fountain, located at the base of the Burj Khalifa. The world's largest choreographed fountain system features a sound and light show which shoots 22,000 gallons of water as high as 150m in the air.

Each brightly illuminated jet sways in time to music, producing what has become one of Dubai's most popular shows. Situated outside The Dubai Mall, make time to shop between evening water shows, which begin every 30 minutes.



Dubai Opera

Experience the region's contemporary cultural scene at Dubai Opera, the city's latest architectural masterpiece.

Shaped like a futuristic dhow, this institution hosts a stellar program of international names and local legends in opera, ballet, theatre and music.

Designed by Danish architect Janus Rostock & located in the heart of Downtown Dubai, the 2,000 seat Dubai Opera is a world-class cultural facility.



Madinat Jumeirah

For an experience that marries tradition and luxury, head to Madinat Jumeirah. Literally translated as 'City of Jumeirah' this complex is inspired by an ancient citadel complete with windtowers and water canals. It encloses luxury hotels, private enclaves built in the traditional style, the world-class Talise Spa, Madinat Souk, Madinat Theatre, and more than 40 restaurants and lounges including several like folly by Nick & Scott which overlooks the sea from windtowers.

You can also explore the complex waterways on a traditional wooden abra to better appreciate the serene passages and inspired architecture.



Burj Khalifa

Soaring 828m above Dubai and currently the world's tallest building, the Burj Khalifa represents a union of art, engineering and heritage. It's home to office space, private residences, the 160-room Armani Hotel and At the Top's observation decks on the 124th and 148th floors. Atmosphere is the world's highest restaurant, with stunning views and an equally stellar menu. There are also more than 1,000 specially commissioned works of art throughout the building.



Palm Jumeirah

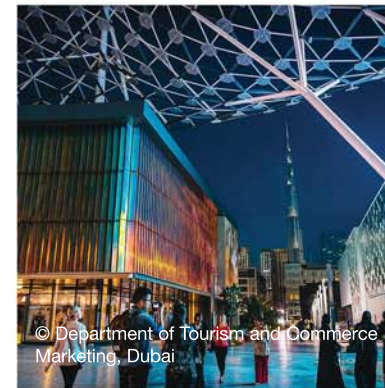

Dubai Water Canal

It will eventually create 80,000sqm of public space to include new hotels and dining and shopping outlets.

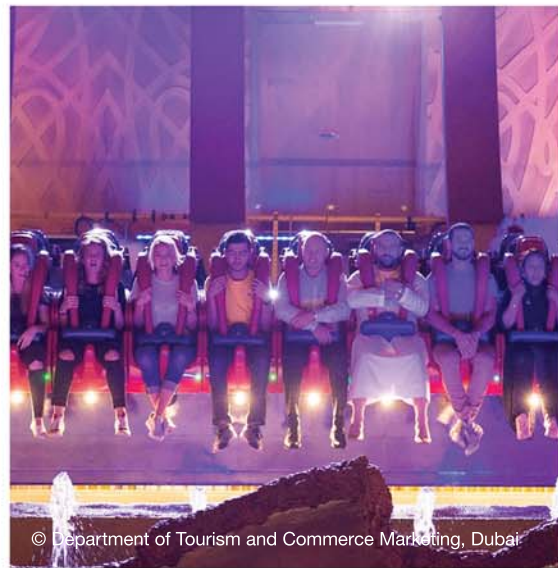
There you will find gold, spice, perfume and textile souks where you can bargain over excellent handicrafts and goods.

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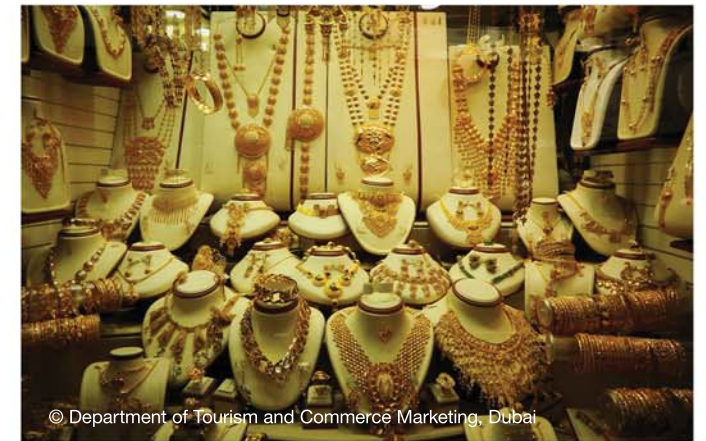
Ain Dubai

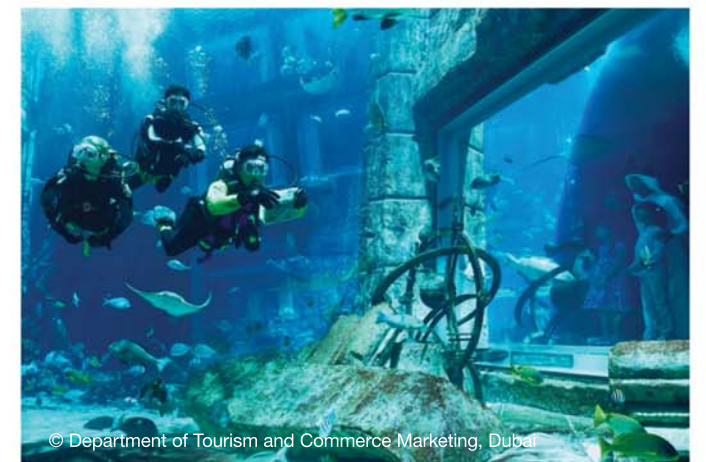

Desert Activities

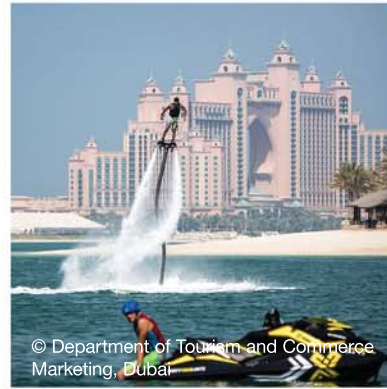

Buggy Safaris

Head off-road with Dune Buggy Dubai to discover the thrills of the desert. You can find activities to suit whatever level of adventure you crave. The Morning Dune Buggy Safari features an early bird hour-long ride in your own open buggy. If you're looking for more, try the Evening Desert Safari. Here, you'll go dune bashing in a brand new Land Rover. After the drive, you'll sit down for live entertainment consisting of a traditional dance show. Food, beverages and henna painting enhance the experience with sand boarding and camel riding available to keep the excitement going until late at night.



Flyboarding

Thrill-seekers can get their kicks at sea in Ghantoot (15 minutes out of town), where Dubai's latest toys are getting hearts racing. Flyboarding, also known as water jet-packing, sees adventure lovers fitted into a small board and strapped to a specially-made backpack that sucks up seawater, before spitting it back out, propelling the rider into the air. If you have never tried it before, no worries. Even beginners will be able to manoeuvre themselves around the marina – just be prepared to make a splash crash-landing the first few attempts.



Skydive Dubai

Soar like a bird over one of the most spectacular drop zones in the world with Skydive Dubai. Step out of a plane at an altitude of almost 4,000m and enjoy the rush. To make sure you remember the experience forever, a cameraman documents the fun. The freefall lasts around a minute before your instructor pops the chute and you begin a leisurely five-minute descent with incredible views of Palm Jumeirah and other iconic landmarks. For an alternative view, try the desert drop zone.



Sandboarding

This is one for true adrenaline-seekers. Strap this snowboard-like contraption to your feet and glide down the dunes just like you would at the slopes of Ski Dubai. While it's possible to rent a sand board at Big Red, there are a number of companies – such as Dream Explorer Dubai – that offer the full experience. The five-hour morning safari and sandboarding package starts off with a desert safari in a Hummer and ends with a sandboarding session, where you'll learn all the tips for making it down the dunes smoothly.



Jet-Ski

Have fun on the water and at the same time take in some of Dubai's famous landmarks with a jet-ski session. Nemo Watersports and Dubai Jetski offer tours that takes in the Burj Al Arab hotel and other sights from the water. Each tour is accompanied by a qualified instructor and you can go as fast or slow as you like, for anywhere from 30 minutes to two hours.

The 30-minute tour features Burj Al Arab while an hour-long session takes you onwards to Jumeirah Beach Residences. The deluxe two-hour version includes this, while also circumnavigating the famous Palm Jumeirah and stopping off at Atlantis, The Palm.



Quad Biking

Direct your taxi driver to Dubai's most famous sand dune, Big Red, where you can hop on a quad bike and navigate the sandy landscape yourself.

Available to hire by the half hour, the quad bikes are speedy and a helmet must be worn while riding.

Follow the natural trail of the dunes, kicking sand in the face of your fellow riders as you hurtle and bounce over Dubai's most iconic patch of sand. Big Red, or Al Hamar as it's locally known, is easy to spot along the Dubai-Hatta (E44) highway. Ask your driver to wait, or hire one for the day.

THE EMPTY QUARTER

The world's largest uninterrupted sand mass, the Rub Al Khali (Empty Quarter) will blow you away with massive expanses of awesome desert and enormous dunes. It's a landscape of ever-changing endless dunes made famous by the British explorer Wilfred Thesiger and his Emirati and Omani companions in the 1940s and 50s.

Almost a fairytale from '1001 nights', the magnificent Qasr Al Sarab or Mirage Palace is a luxurious oasis in the midst of the desert. Resembling an old Arabian fortress town nestled in the valley of mountainous dunes, this is actually a five-star resort letting you experience lots of desert activities – dune dawn walks, camel trekking, dune bashing, falconry shows and camp fire barbecues.

Perched at the edge of the majestic Rub Al Khali, Tilal Al Liwa is a stunningly secluded desert hideaway. There are restaurants, a sparkling outdoor pool, and a full range of desert activities.

Considered by many to be the world's tallest sand dune, Tel Moreeb is over 300 metres high and the 50 degree incline to the top makes it a prime destination for motor sports enthusiasts. Every winter, the region's most powerful four wheel drivers and quad bikers compete in the Moreeb Hill Climb event, which is part of the Liwa International Festival.

ARABIAN NIGHTS VILLAGE

Nestled among stunning dunes, Arabian Nights Village harnesses the soul and essence of old Arabia. Conceived to let visitors experience the mythical and timeless beauty of the desert and aspects of traditional Emirati life. The desert journey begins as experienced guides transport guests over towering dunes. As they approach the village – which emerges surprisingly from a gigantic dune valley – guests enter a picturesque courtyard overlooked by two traditional-styled watchtowers - Zakher and Al Manhal - each named after residences of the late Sheikh Zayed Bin Sultan Al Nahyan, The Father of the Nation.

There are four types of accommodation available - Bedouin tents (Bayt Al Shaaer), palm houses (Bayt Al Bahar), desert houses (Bayt Al Bar), and The Fort Tower (Al Manha), inviting visitors to relaxing Arabian interiors, which transport them to different lifestyles from Abu Dhabi's past.

With lots of desert activities available for the whole family, guests can ride camels, rev-up quad bikes to surmount towering crescents, get the adrenalin pumping while dune bashing with fully qualified drivers, and sand surf down sheer inclines.

The village also offers morning safari, spectacular camel trekking experience and 'Fat' biking with special packages designed for couples looking for a romantic getaway.

Although internet is available for emergencies, there are no TVs on-site, so guests enjoy sheer tranquility.

Serving a mix of Arabic and international Cuisine, the Al Maqam restaurant (meaning 'The Gathering Place'), is where visitors meet and eat together, while listening to traditional Arabic music. There's also an idyllic 200m² swimming pool to cool down in.

DESERT SAFARIS & CAMPING

Experience the breathtaking dunes of Al Khaznah between the UAE capital and our Oasis City of Al Ain or explore the desert expanse outside the Liwa oasis in Al Dhafra. With high dunes and long sand valleys, you'll never get bored of adrenaline fuelled dune bashing.

Most desert safaris include a thrill-a-minute spot of dune bashing, sand skiing, quad biking, a visit to a camel farm, camel riding, and a traditional meal under the stars. Overnight stays let you enjoy smoky sunsets and luminous sunrises.

AL BADEYAH EYES TOURISM

The Al Badeyah desert camp, nestled in the desert dunes of Al Khaznah, gives visitors a unique insight into UAE traditions and customs and allows them to enjoy an authentic Arabian experience under the stars.

Offering different desert safari services, the camp boasts five permanent tents with beds, an original majlis tent for evening activities, two permanent bathroom facilities, along with a children's playground, trampoline and a petting zoo of goats and sheep.

A variety of tour operators offer dune bashing trips. Alternatively, when you can tackle the dunes while you stay at Qasr Al Sarab Desert Resort by Anantara or Tilal Liwa. A half day or an overnight stay at the Arabian Nights Village also includes a dune basing experience.

OFF-ROAD DRIVING

The massive Empty Quarter dunes present an awesome driving challenge. If you're in the country during the cooler months and you like adventure, rent a four wheel drive, find a group of eager drivers (you'll need at least three vehicles; never drive alone in the desert) and set out for the sand. Be sure that your vehicle is insured for off-road use and that you have the proper equipment. If you've never driven off road, you should first learn the ropes with one of the several tour companies in Abu Dhabi.

Camping

A trip to the desert isn't complete without a night under the stars. You can arrange camping adventures with a tour company or rent a four wheel drive and buy the equipment yourself. Camping supplies are surprisingly cheap in the emirates and there is no need to buy high quality equipment. In fact, you could probably buy a tent and two sleeping bags from a hypermarket for less than a guided tour. Never go out in the desert alone!



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SAND BOARDING & SKIING

Skiing takes on a whole new meaning on Abu Dhabi's desert dunes. Boasting the world's largest dunes, towering hundreds of metres above the surrounding plains, the Liwa Oasis on the edges of the Rub al-Khali or Empty Quarter is a sand skier's paradise. So strap on your sand board and sashay down the seemingly endless red sand slopes for an exhilarating experience. For novice skiers, daunted by the 300 metre Liwa dunes, skiing down gentler slopes that stretch across the Abu Dhabi desert may be the place to start this daring adventure.

A word of caution though: desert temperatures will be quite high during the day, so aim for the dunes in the early morning. Wear light clothes, sunglasses and a hat to protect yourself from the strong sun, and don't forget to use plenty of sunscreen.

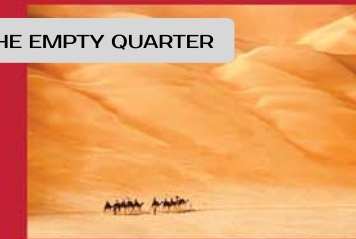

Nurai Island is situated in the pristine waters of the Arabian Gulf to the east of the Abu Dhabi city coastline. Just a ten-minute boat ride from Saadiyat Island, the secluded island is conveniently accessible from all major travel ports in the UAE.

Inspired by the Arabic word 'nur' meaning 'light' – Nurai Island is a stunning piece of paradise that is the perfect retreat for those looking for peace and tranquility, complemented by unparalleled and uninterrupted Arabian Gulf views. The island is also home to Zaya Nurai Island, a unique, boutique private island resort with a 32-bed, all villa hotel and five food and beverage outlets.

The dining options at Zaya include Nurai's Terrace, Beach Burger, Latitude, Olive and Salare and all outlets are open to residents and non-residents alike. However, dining reservations must be made in advance but do include complimentary boat transfer to and from the island.

SAADIYAT ISLANDS

Just seven minutes from downtown Abu Dhabi and 20 minutes from Abu Dhabi International Airport, the 27 square kilometre Saadiyat Island is undergoing a remarkable transformation into a world class leisure, residential, business and cultural hub of global proportions, housing the world's largest single concentration of premier cultural assets. The island's purpose built visitor centre - Manarat Al Saadiyat (which translates from Arabic as 'a place of enlightenment'), brings Saadiyat's vision to life, complemented perfectly by a permanently open-to-the-public exhibition: 'The Saadiyat Story' gives visitors an interactive narrative on the history and cultural vision behind the island.

Moved piece by piece from Shanghai, where it welcomed almost two million visitors to the UAE's national exhibition during the World Expo 2010, the UAE Pavilion is emerging as a new landmark exhibition and events venue. Hosting some of the country's most important cultural functions, the striking dune-shaped structure was designed by London's acclaimed Foster + Partners.

Saadiyat Beach Golf Club is the region's first ocean course; the Gary Player-designed masterpiece respectfully harnesses the natural beauty of Saadiyat Island's magnificent, white sand beaches for a truly unique playing experience.

With two five star properties already opened - The St. Regis Saadiyat Island Resort, Abu Dhabi and Park Hyatt Abu Dhabi - and more in the pipeline, the island's leisure and hospitality offering is rapidly increasing.

With its own distinctive style, the exclusive Saadiyat Beach Club celebrates the elegance and peacefulness of this unique island. Leisure services include an outdoor swimming pool, a workout room with fitness and wellness programmes, spa facilities, sauna and steam rooms, kids' pool and playing areas, and private cabanas and loungers set on the stunning, white beach.

Set on the island's serene natural shores, the 400-metre Saadiyat Public Beach is a great spot for a day out, and the perfect place to enjoy Abu Dhabi's clean, warm turquoise waters.

There are lounge chairs, showers, bathrooms, lockers, changing rooms, towels, umbrellas, ample parking and lifeguards are on duty throughout the day. The beach is open daily from 8am to 8pm, and entry is AED 25 (US\$ 6.8) for adults and AED 15 (US\$ 4.1) for children over six years old.

The original 'guests' of Abu Dhabi's Saadiyat Island, the Hawksbill sea turtles, continue to nest on the destination's sweeping beachfront. The nine kilometre Saadiyat Beach plays host to several Hawksbill turtle nests every year.

The Hawksbill is listed as critically endangered on the International Union for Conservation of Nature's Red List, as its population has declined by more than 80 per cent worldwide over the last three generations due to habitat destruction and poaching. Since master developer Tourism Development & Investment Company began its Hawksbill Turtle Conservation Programme in early 2010, getting the buy in of developers, contractors and now resort operators, some 650 eggs have hatched successfully on Saadiyat.

SIR BANI YAS ISLANDS

A nature-based destination alive with wildlife and adventure activities, a 5-star boutique hotel, luxury villas, purpose-built stables and historical sites, Sir Bani Yas Island is one of the eight which make up the Desert Islands in Al Dhafra.

Recently awarded the 'World's Leading Sustainable Tourism Destination' at the 2014 World Travel Awards in Anguilla, more than half the island is made up of the Arabian Wildlife Park, one of region's largest wildlife reserves, which is home to more than 10,000 free roaming animals including Arabian Oryx, gazelles and giraffes, hyenas and cheetahs. Guests can take a 4x4 Nature & Wildlife Drive of the park in specially made vehicles accompanied by expert guides.

With three Anantara Hotels Resorts & Spas' retreats on the island, guests can enjoy five-star accommodation at Desert Islands Resort & Spa by Anantara, beach front seclusion at Anantara Al Yamm Villa Resort on the eastern shores, and marvel at the natural beauty of Sir Bani Yas Island at Anantara Al Sahel Villa Resort.

The state-of-the-art stables offers a variety of equestrian activities and lessons, each tailored to meet individual abilities. Sir Bani Yas Island can also be explored with tours provided by Danat Resort Jebel Dhanna.

The island is also home to UAE's only discovered Christian monastery, which can be visited during a Desert Islands Resort & Spa Culture Tour. Believed to have been built around 600 AD, and abandoned in 750 AD, the monastery was initially discovered during excavations in 1992.

YAS ISLANDS

An emerging entertainment destination within a 30 minute drive of the UAE capital, Yas Island is home to the state-of-the-art Yas Marina Circuit – host to the annual F1™ Etihad Airways Abu Dhabi Grand Prix. Get to grips with Yas Marina Circuit through a series of track day packages, including 'Driver Experiences', 'Passenger Experiences', 'Private Driving Tuition' programmes and 'Racing License Courses'.

At the circuit's centrepiece is Yas Viceroy Abu Dhabi, a five star, iconic hotel – the only one in the world to straddle an F1 race track being breathtakingly built half on land and half over water.

Attracting Super Yachts from as far away as Australia for the annual F1™ Etihad Airways Abu Dhabi Grand Prix, the Yas Marina is central to Abu Dhabi's ambitions of becoming a strong rival to traditional yachting grounds such as the Mediterranean and Caribbean. Overlooking the stunning Yas Marina F1™ Circuit, Cipriani features signature dishes from Harry's Bar in Venice and classic Italian favourites.

It's fast and furious fun for all ages at Ferrari World Abu Dhabi-the world's first Ferrari-branded theme park. The park tells the Ferrari story with passion and excitement through more than 20 exhilarating and educational rides and attractions, interactive shopping and authentic Italian dining experiences.

Yas Waterworld spans an area of around 15 football pitches, with 43 rides, slides and attractions – five of which are one-of-a-kind. Visitors to this futuristic waterpark will be able to try the 238-metre long, world's first, and largest hydromagnetic-powered, six-person tornado waterslide. For adrenaline seekers there are three-metre high waves on Bubble's Barrel, which has the world's largest surfable sheet wave for flowboards and bodyboards.

The Bandit Bomber, a 550-metre coaster, is the first with onboard water and laser effects. Riders can shoot jets of water at targets, drop water bombs and trigger special effects, while people below can spray them with water as they pass. On the west shores of Yas Island, Yas Links Abu Dhabi – an award-winning golf course, designed by Kyle Phillips, one of the world's leading golf course architects - is in line with the traditional links golf commonly associated with the coastal towns of Scotland and Ireland. Voted among the 'Top 10 New International Golf Courses' by the influential US publication Golf Magazine, Yas Links features a 7,450 yard par 72 course, utilising five teeing grounds per hole, with all 18 benefiting from ocean views. Recently Yas Links has also been named one of the world's top 25 by influential US magazine, Golf Digest.

Set on Yas Island's tranquil southern shores, Yas Beach is the island's only stretch of beach. Open daily from 10am – 7pm, it is a great spot to relax and enjoy sun, sea, sand, food and drinks, and there's plenty of car parking available. Admission, which includes beach towel and sun lounger, is AED 50 (US\$ 13.60) for adults and AED 25 (US\$ 6.80) for children aged 8-16 during the week, and AED 100 (US\$ 27.25) for adults, and AED 50 (US\$ 13.60) for children during weekend. Children under 8 enter free. Saturday is half-price for ladies. Guests staying at Yas Plaza hotels have complimentary beach access on presentation of their room card or hotel voucher.

The island also houses Abu Dhabi's biggest and the UAE's second largest shopping centre, the Yas Mall. The mall provides a vibrant getaway shopping experience for tourists, international guests and local residents.

AL MARYAH ISLANDS

This developing business, leisure and entertainment hub is Abu Dhabi's new Central Business District. With dramatic turquoise sea views, the luxurious, five-star Rosewood Abu Dhabi sits at the core of the vibrant Sowwah Square.

Adjacent to it, The Galleria has over 130 of the world's most renowned brand outlets - including 50 Abu Dhabi 'firsts'.

REEM ISLANDS

This residential and commercial project off Abu Dhabi island's coast, is home to one of the emirate's architectural landmarks – the linked, Stonehenge-style Gate Towers.

In the heart of the island, with an imposing central dome, Paris-Sorbonne University Abu Dhabi was the first French higher-education institution to open in the Gulf, and the university's first international campus.

DELMA ISLANDS

Inhabited for over 7,000 years and once one of the Gulf's most important pearl diving centres, Delma Island continues to maintain strong links to its maritime heritage.

One of the oldest known permanent settlements in the UAE, the island boasts some of the region's earliest evidence of date palm cultivation along with Mesopotamian pottery and finely flaked stone tools. With a good supply of fresh water, the island is surprisingly fertile, with many farms and plantations growing a wide variety of produce.

Delma Island can be visited by ferries from Jebel Dhanna.

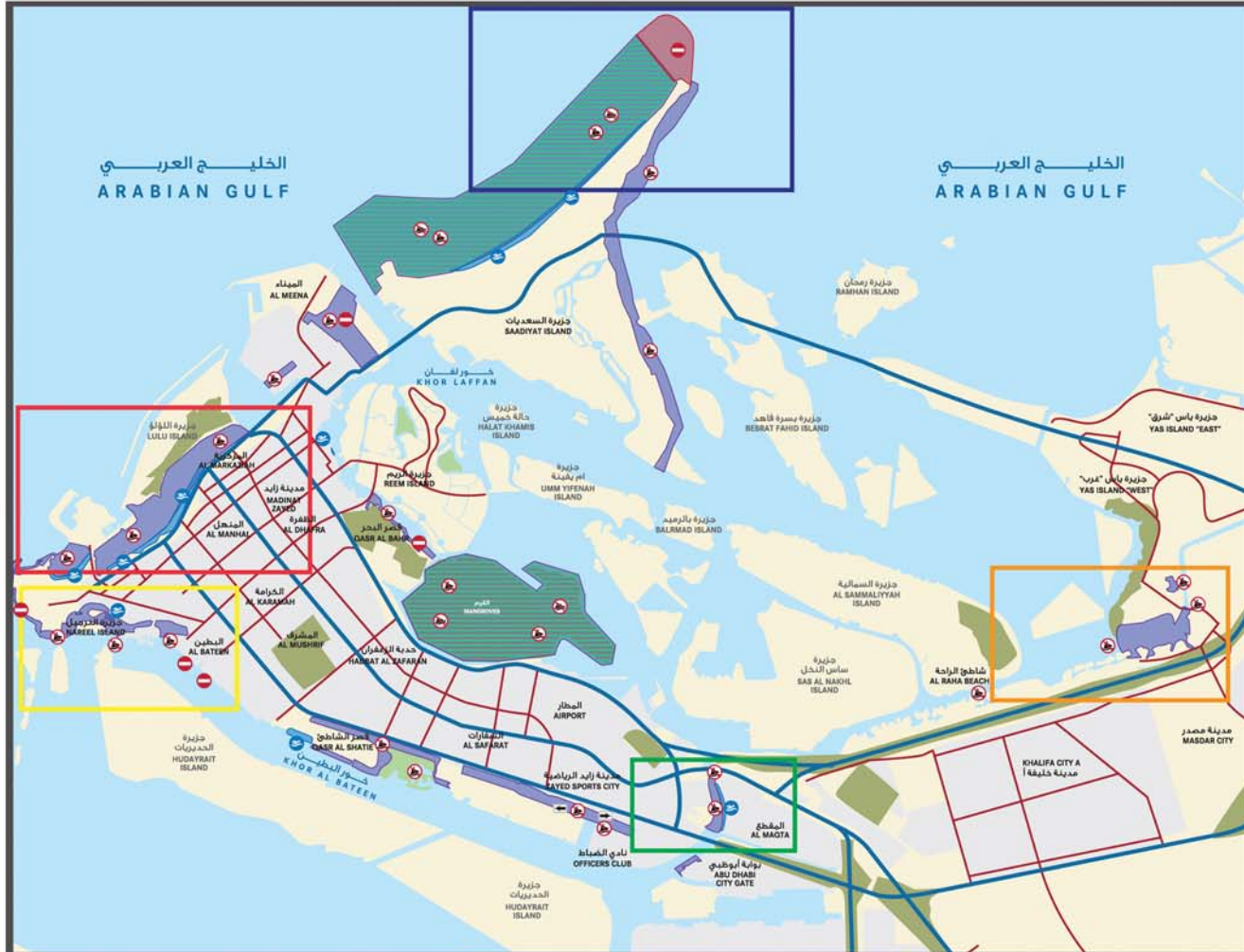

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Adventure

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From exploring one of the largest cave chambers in the world, Majlis Al Jinn, to snorkelling the colourful coral reefs of Daymaniyat Islands or camping under the stars in the A'Sharqiyah Sands; adventure is at the heart of every journey through Oman.

Thanks to its diverse landscapes, ranging from Rocky Mountains with green terrace fields to bustling souks selling camels on the edge of the desert or watching baby turtles hatch on the beach, the Sultanate welcomes all travellers seeking adventures of a lifetime.

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WATER SPORTS

Oman looks back on a proud maritime history, renowned for Dhow building and trading across the seas. As such, Omanis are known to have a special connection with the sea, settling where there are natural harbours and great fishing grounds.

It comes as no surprise that the Sultanate, with over 3,000km of coastline and rich marine life, has become one of the world's fastest-growing diving spots. Areas such as Al Khayran, Al Fahil Island, Daymaniyat Islands and Al Makbara Bay are incredibly popular with the discerning diver.

Several tour operators specialise in water sports, such as snorkelling, sailing, jet skiing, and kayaking. For those visitors seeking their own water adventures, yachts and boats are also available for hire.

CAMEL RIDING

Historically, camels were used by local Bedouins for transporting goods and people through the desert and around the country. Today, owning camels has become more a sign of prestige, with many Omanis breeding them for racing and beauty contests.

Visitors can still enjoy a taste of the traditional Bedouin lifestyle by setting off on a desert safari in the A'Sharqiyah Sands and Rub Al Khali. Nothing quite beats seeing the sun set while on a camel's back. Several local tour operators offer comprehensive camel safaris.

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MOUNTAIN BIKING & CYCLING

Cycling and mountain biking has risen in popularity, with both amateur and professional cyclists appreciating the country for its stunning diverse landscapes and the new challenge that riding in Oman presents. The Tour of Oman, a professional road race, has become an annual event since its inaugural race in 2010, drawing many spectators from the region & generally instilling an interest in cycling into the local population. The Haute Route is coming to Oman for the first time in 2019 and is sure to capture the imagination of cyclists from around the world. Visitors can experience Oman on two wheels by booking any of the road or mountain biking excursions offered by a local tour operator. Alternatively, adventurers can find their own path in areas such as Al Hamra, Al Jebel Al Akhdar, Jebel Shams, Musandam and Yiti.

KITE SURFING

A fantastic combination of surfing and paragliding makes for an incredibly challenging, yet exhilarating sport enjoyed by many in Oman. In fact, the Sultanate is known around the world as an up-and-coming kitesurfing destination. Particularly popular on Masirah Island, kite surfing there is best enjoyed in the summer months, when temperatures are around 25°C and the island receives some of the monsoon winds that bring rains to Dhofar and turn it into a green wonderland.

OFF-ROADING

Many of Oman's stunning attractions are off the beaten track and require a 4WD vehicle. Whether dune bashing in the desert or exploring a wadi, off-roading is one of the best ways to truly experience some of Oman's most exciting areas. Some of the best locations for off-roading include Wadi Bani Awf, Al Jebel Al Akhdar and Jebel Shams, as well as many of the other scenic wadis dotted around the country. Visitors are asked to use caution when venturing off-road, as help is often far away and roads may be dangerous if the driver is not experienced. In many cases, it is best to travel with at least two cars or opt for a guided excursion.

CAVING

Home to the second largest cave chamber in the world (Majlis Al Jinn on the Salmah Plateau) and numerous others, the Sultanate has plenty of caves to explore. Some, like Al Hoota Cave near Al Hamra or the Muqal Cave in Wadi Bani Khalid, don't require specialised equipment and can be explored by visitors with average fitness levels. However, the caves at Majlis Al Jinn are for experienced cavers only and also require additional equipment and permissions.

GOLF

Golf has a history in the Sultanate dating back to 1970s. With world-class golf clubs in Muscat – the Al Mouj Golf Club, Muscat Hills Golf and Country Club, Ghala Valley Golf Club, and the Ras Al Hamra Golf Club - perfect golfing weather is usually experienced between September and May, and during the evenings in Summer.

CAMPING

From the white pebble sand beaches of Fins and Sur, to rocky outcrops above the clouds on Jebel Samham in Dhofar, Oman has hundreds of stunning camping locations for visitors to choose from. While wild camping is a favourite pastime in the Sultanate, campers must ensure they are not on private land or damaging land or livestock. That includes disposing of rubbish in designated bins only. Those looking for more comfortable camping options, can book one of the available desert camps or join a local tour operator that offers organised camping trips.

STAND UP PADDLE BOARDING (SUP)

Taking off as a new leisure activity in the early 2000s, Stand Up Paddle Boarding has gained momentum in Sultanate, quickly earning itself a reputation as a great SUP location thanks to its over 3,000km long coastline. Shatti Beach and other beaches in Muscat are some of the best starting points for an unforgettable SUP session, depending on the paddler's level of fitness and comfort.

Local companies manufacture paddle boards to international standards right here in Oman, while others offer equipment hire and lessons if required.





Oman takes great pride in its magnificent ecology and diverse flora and fauna, actively protecting it through the establishment of nature reserves such as the Daymaniyat Islands near Muscat, the turtle reserve at Ras Al Jinz, the Land of Frankincense in Dhofar or the Arabian Oryx Sanctuary in Al Wusta. Special attention is given to threatened or endangered species, as the oceans surrounding Oman are home to a range of fish species as well as dolphins and migrating whales; together with intricate corals and unique species of seaweeds that support the marine ecosystem.

Inland, protected areas cover vast areas serving as important breeding grounds for endangered species such as the Arabian Oryx, Nubian Ibex or rare Arabian Leopard. The Sultanate is also a bird watcher's paradise, witnessing the migration of over 130 species of birds each year. Nature reserves and habitats in the Sultanate cover an area of almost 30,000 square kilometers and also encompass reserves dedicated to plant life; the most famous being Oman's frankincense trees.



WILDLIFE WATCHING

If you have ever witnessed endangered Green Turtle babies hatch and try to make their way to the water, you will know what a special experience it is. Oman remains dedicated to enabling these kind of wildlife encounters while protecting the animals. Nature reserves are present throughout the country, on- and off-shore, to keep animals safe in their natural habitat. Examples are the As Saleel Nature Park in the A'Sharqiyah region, which provides a safe haven for the Arabian Gazelle and Omani Wild Cat (Al Senmar), and the Jebel Samhan Nature Reserve, one of the last places of the wild Arabian Leopard.

An equally dedicated level of protection is extended toward marine life, including the turtle reserve at Ras al Jinz and the uninhabited Daymaniyat Islands. Local operators offer regular dolphin and whale watching tours, with several bird watching groups also in existence.



WADIS

Wadis are dry riverbeds or small valleys. Some have stunning water pools, fed by natural springs, and a backdrop of rugged mountains. Others are framed by date and fruit plantations that to this day are tended by locals using traditional falaj or waterways.

The most well-known wadis include Wadi Shab and Wadi Bani Khalid, both of which carry water year round and have adjoining caves that add to the adventure. Others, such as Wadi Mayh, Wadi Mistal or Wadi Bani Awf require a 4x4 to explore but are worth the extra effort, thanks to unbelievable settings, scenic villages and views to write home about.



MOUNTAINS

Mountains take up a large part of Oman's landscape, varying greatly in appearance vegetation. Often times they feature stunning wadis, cut into the mountains through time and crossable only by 4x4.

The mountains in Salalah, due to regular rainfall in summer time, remain green nearly all year round. The Al Hajar mountains range, which extends from A'Sharqiyah all the way to Musandam, features Oman's highest peak – Jebel Shams, home to Oman's very own Grand Canyon.

Al Jebel Al Akhdar, also known as Green Mountain, is also part of the Al Hajar range. Its top is the Saiq Plateau, which runs across many kilometres and is home to numerous scenic terrace fields and mountain villages.



BEACHES

With over 3,000 km of pristine coastline, Oman has some seriously beautiful beaches to call its own. Whether it is the rugged coastline of Ras Al Madrakah, the white sands of Fins Beach or the endless expanse of Masirah Island beaches, visitors are welcome to enjoy beach walks, picnics and wild camping.

Hotels such as the Al Bustan Palace and Shangri La Barr Al Jissah Resort and Spa have their own beaches, linked with popular activities such as kayaking or jet skiing. Public beaches, such as in Shatti Al Qurum in Muscat, draw residents playing beach soccer or hosting family barbecues.



DESERTS

The interior of Oman is the gateway to one of the largest sand deserts in the world - the famous Empty Quarter or Rub Al Khali. Covering a large area of the Arabian Peninsula, this unique ecosystem is covered by sand dunes up to 250 metres in heights in certain areas, and salty planes in others.

Leading up to the coast in the A'Sharqiyah region are the A'Sharqiyah Sands, original homeland of the Bedouins and one of the most popular camping destinations in Oman. Away from the hustle and bustle of city or village life, visitors to this unique environment appreciate it for its easy accessibility and golden sands.

Both the Rub Al Khali and A'Sharqiyah Sands have a diverse ecosystem, with anything from small mammals to desert foxes calling it home. Plants such as ghaif trees too have adapted to the arid desert climate and the fact that there is little annual rainfall.



GEOLOGY

Looking back on a geological history spanning across millions of years, Oman is one of the few places that carries its unique geological heritage on the open. Attractions such as Jebel Shams, or the Ophiolite rocks surrounding Muttrah Corniche, were once at the bottom of the ocean.

For geology enthusiasts, Oman is a haven of geo-heritage sites that can be accessed directly by car, boat, trekking, or rock climbing. These range from quartzite at Al Awabi to the marble of Bawshar; to even million-year old Eocene limestone that makes up Al Fahal (Shark) Island. Each of these sites are impressive and awe-inspiring in their own right.



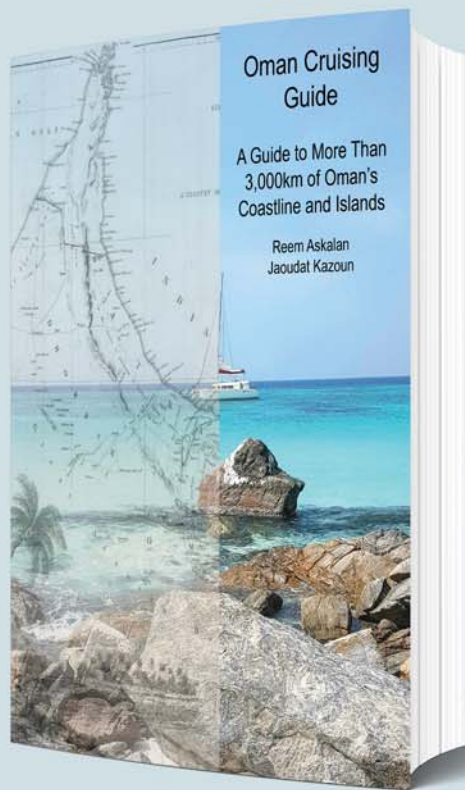
GEOGRAPHY

Oman is a wonderland for travellers with a keen interest in geology. Geological stories can be found just about anywhere, from Oman's highest mountain, Jebel Shams, to the mega-dunes of the Empty Quarter (Rub Al Khali) and the Rock Garden at Duqm.

The Sultanate of Oman is the only country in the world composed mostly of oceanic crust and rocks that originate from the Earth's mantle. Evidence of continental drift can be witnessed in many of the unusual rock formations and topography around Oman, including the coastline around Muscat.

One of the most outstanding geological features of the country is the Al Hajar Mountain range, which forms an arc from the north-west to the south-east of the country.

Jebel Shams, at just over 3000 metres, is Oman's highest mountain and truly a geological outdoor museum with fossils embedded in rocks hundreds of metres above sea level.



SAILING IN OMAN

THE MIDDLE EAST BEST-KEPT SECRET

The Sultanate of Oman strategic location has been an on going inspiration for its legendary maritime heritage. From 2050 B.C. until today, Oman's sea routes have serviced the world's industrial and commercial centers of the time. Its rich maritime heritage is as old as history. Civilizations have come and gone while Omani sailors and traders have roamed the world. The flow of goods and people extended from China to the Americas.

Oman is home to the legends of Sindibad the sailor of Arabian Nights stories and the Atlantis of the Sands (the lost city of Ubar). The frankincense trade through land and sea has connected Oman to the world while reaching Roman and Pharaoh empires. Its fame attracted explorers and travelers like Marco Polo and Ibn Batutta while its location brought the Chinese General Zheng He and invaders like the Persians and the Portuguese.

Locally, the influence of seafaring have spilled over to Oman inland mountains and created cultural and economic ties. The maritime trade connection flows from both directions: dates from inland plantations are exported and wood and spices are imported. Throughout history, there has been movement of people from inland to coastal areas and vice versa. Until today, the fishermen, as summer approaches and the fishing season comes to a halt, move with their families to work in date plantations. The cultural and economic exchange has manifested itself throughout Oman's social mosaic and heritage.

Today's Oman has 3,165Km of coastline that varies from pristine, stunning and secluded sandy beaches, rugged jagged cliffs, soaring sand dunes and flourishing coral reefs. Three countries and three geographically distinct bodies of water bound the Sultanate of Oman.

Oman has the longest coastline in the Arab World and, yet, it is often described as its best-kept secret.

Oman's seas, islands, reefs, inlets, fjords, sea salts, wetlands, mangrove lagoons and underwater canyons fuel rich biodiversity of marine and birds habitats. There are 524 bird species recorded in Oman.

The seas of Oman are teeming with more than 900 species of fish, which range from cleaner wrasse to whale sharks. They are breeding grounds for dolphins and whales. Oman waters have five of the world's seven turtle species. Approximately 20,000 turtles come mostly to east Oman beaches to lay 50,000 to 60,000 eggs.

There are 530km square of coral reefs spread throughout the coast. These reefs support over 100 species of coral and 579 species of reef fish. The rich-nutrient seas of Oman make it one of the largest fisheries economies in the Middle East. Most of its waters lie within the tropics, but nevertheless, they offer seasonal variability like the ones found in any of the world's oceans.

The two main climatic influences are the winter and summer monsoons. The winter monsoon from November to April is characterized by a relatively gentle and variable dry northeast wind. The dynamic and forceful southwest summer monsoon from May to September reverses this circulation pattern bringing cold, nutrient-rich waters to the Arabian Sea.

The breath-taking coastline topography is just as diverse and with mountains in the north and south, cliffs, bights and desert in the central region and coastal plains along the northeast coast. The al-Hajar Mountains rise from the Strait of Hormuz and extend southeast for 600km finishing at Sur near the eastern end of the Arabian Peninsula. In certain areas the mountains reach 3000m high. Samhan Mountain in Dhofar region rise to around 1800m with escarpment seen mostly from sea only.

Oman Cruising Guide is the first comprehensive reference for cruising the coast of Oman. It covers a detailed description of over 50 anchorage sites in addition to harbors and marinas. This guide highlights the connection between sea and land tourism along its long coastline. There are ample places to visit while cruising along the coast.

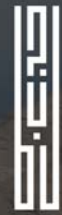

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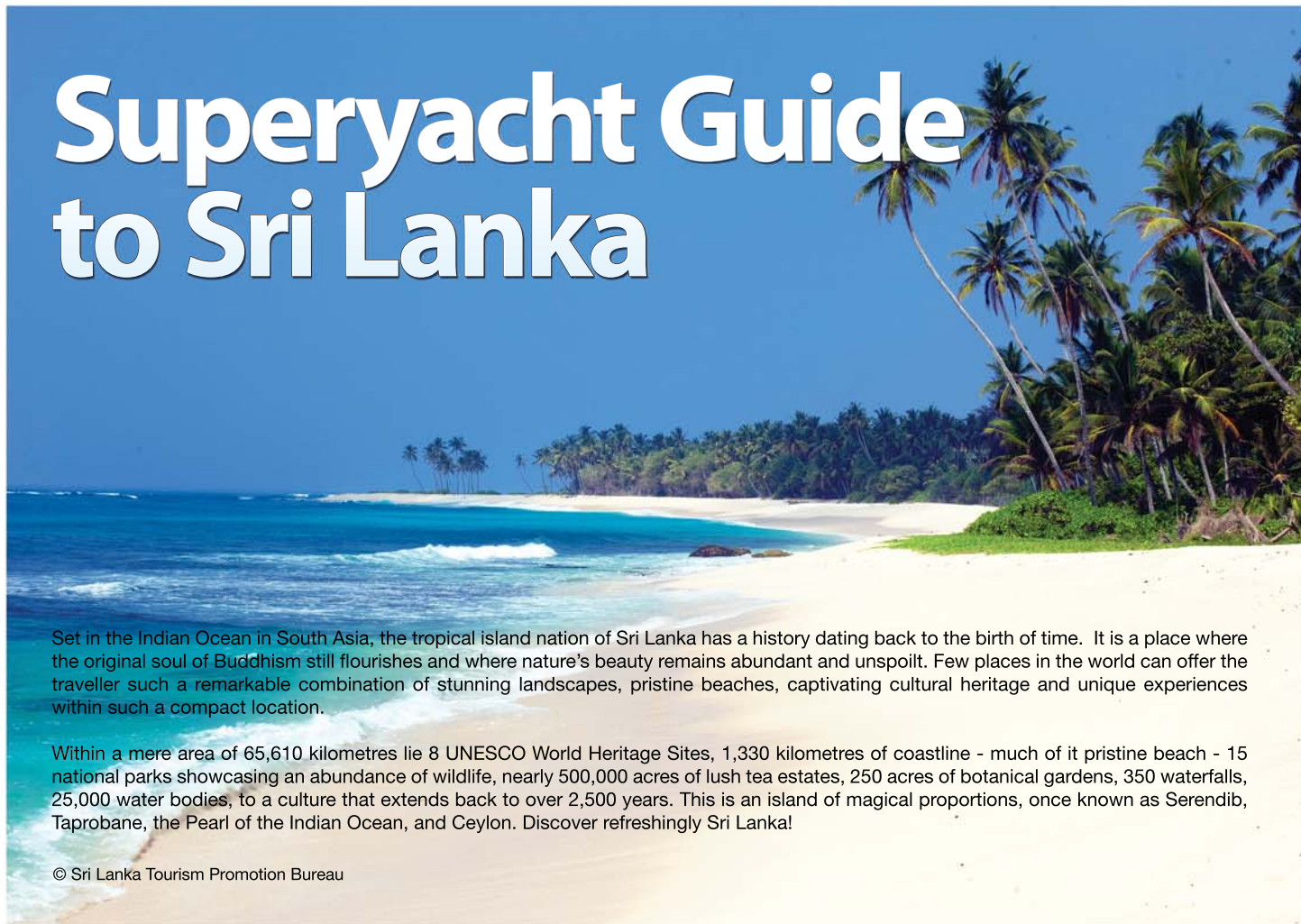

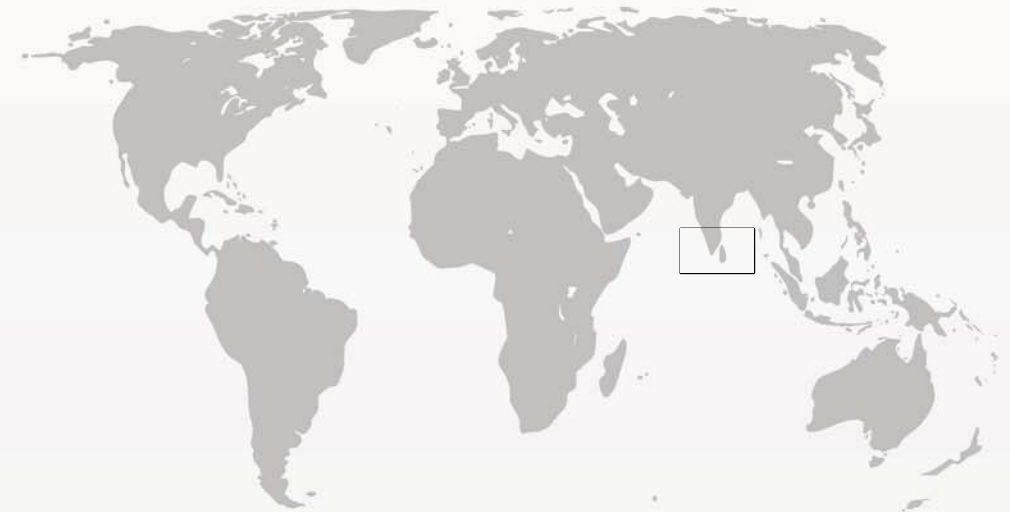

Mirissa Whale Watching

The ever smiling, mischievous dolphins will put on a show while some of the oldest and the largest sea creatures, the humpback and the blue whales, will nonchalantly glide past you, when you embark on a whale/dolphin watching excursion off the Southern, Eastern or the West coast of Sri Lanka. The ideal locations for whale watching would be Dondra Point (accessible from Galle, Hikkaduwa and Mirissa) and Trincomalee while the sea off Kalpitiya teems with an abundance of dolphins.

Sri Lanka Coast Guards assures a safer season of whale watching at Mirissa. With the whale watching season in Mirissa being in full swing and many local and foreign tourists gathering to the Mirissa harbor, The Sri Lanka Coast Guards had increased their vigilance in monitoring the implementation of Sea Mammals Observation, Regulation and Control Regulations.

To ensure that the Regulations are adhered to by boat operators and tourists engaged in whale watching, the members of the Rohana Coast Guard base had been observing whale and dolphin watching activities in Mirissa since last year. The coast guards also make sure that the boat operators; crew and the tourists abide the safety precautions and regulations before and during their tour of observation.

Yala National Park

There are six national parks and three wildlife sanctuaries in the vicinity of Yala. Among the largest is Lunugamvehera National Park. The park is situated in the dry semi-arid climatic region and rain is received mainly during the northeast monsoon. Yala hosts a variety of ecosystems ranging from moist monsoon forests to freshwater and marine wetlands. It is one of the 70 Important Bird Areas (IBAs) in Sri Lanka.

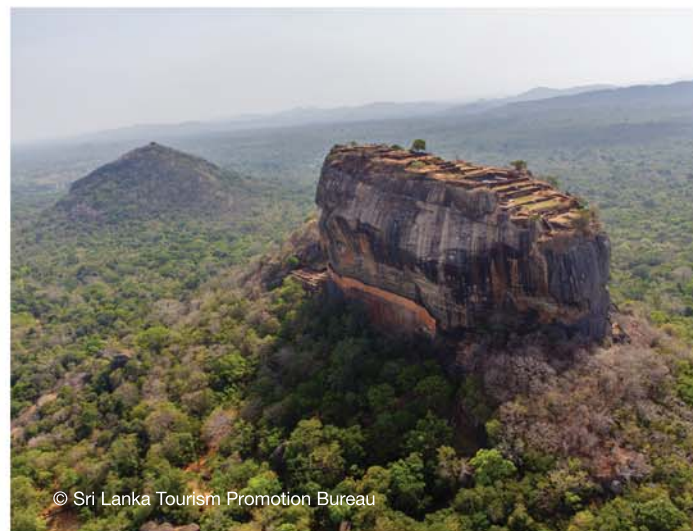
Yala harbours 215 bird species including six endemic species of Sri Lanka. The number of mammals that has been recorded from the park is 44, and it has one of the highest leopard densities in the world. The area around Yala has hosted several ancient civilisations. Two important pilgrim sites, Sithulpahuwa and Magul Vihara, are situated within the park.

Sigiriya

The distance from the Colombo is 169km and is on the way to Anuradhapura or polonnaruwa. Sigiriya was designated as a world heritage site in 1982. Sigiriya is famous for it's palace ruins on top of a massive 200 meter high rock surrounded by the remains of an extensive network of gardens, reservoirs and other structures.

The rock itself is a lava plug left over from an ancient long extinct volcano. It is also renowned for its ancient paintings (frescoes), which are similar to those found at Ajanta Caves in India. It is generally agreed, however, that the Sigiriya Frescoes exhibit a uniquely Sri Lankan style. Sigiriya may have been inhabited through prehistoric times.

It was used as a rock-shelter mountain monastery from about the 5th century BC, with caves prepared and donated by devotees of the Buddhist Sangha. Sigiriya Museum shows photos of the excavation of Sigiriya, reproductions of the frescoes, examples and translations of some of the graffiti on the Mirror Wall, and artifacts excavated from the site. You can probably view the museum in about 1 hour. Since the museum is outside the main entrance,

Hot Air Ballooning

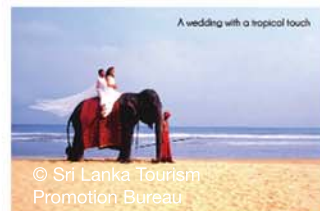

The wide sandy beach, strong waves, and vibrant coral reef make it a great location for surfing, snorkeling, and diving. Famed for its lively nightlife, Hikkaduwa has an abundance of inexpensive bars, café, nightclubs, and accommodation, catering to the beach partygoers.

SOUTH COAST



Galle

Crowned as a UNESCO World Heritage Site, the quaint seaside town of Galle is renowned for its colonial charm and impressive Dutch ramparts. The Galle Port and enclosed area were developed by the Dutch from the 16th to the 18th Century and as you stroll along the quiet streets you will come across the Dutch Reformed Church, All Saints Anglican Church, Meeran Jumma Masjid Mosque, the regal Galle Lighthouse, the Dutch Museum, the clock tower, picturesque villas, chic boutique hotels and inviting restaurants. The Galle Cricket Stadium brings life to this town during international Cricket Tournaments.



Weligama

Weligama is a picturesque bay with lonely stretches of white sand and pristine waters. The bay's most prominent features are Tarprobane Island which houses a beautiful white villa, owned by the French Count de Maunay in the 1930s. Immerse yourself in the magic of Weligama as you observe the unique stilt fishermen in action, the art of lace-making by the local ladies and the beautiful colonial architecture of this quaint village.



Tangalle

Tangalle is a secluded haven, boasting miles of unspoiled golden coast dotted with rocky cliffs and Godellawela Beach in Tangalle is known to be one of the most beautiful beaches in Sri Lanka. Ideal excursion locations nearby Tangalle would be MulKirigala Rock Monastery and Wewurukannala Temple. Tangalle is also located within close proximity to the amazing Hummanaya blowhole and Rekawa turtle conservation site, all of them which are well worth to visit.

EAST COAST



Arugam Bay

Listed as one of the top 10 surf sports in the world, this quaint fishing village has a vast expanse of coral-white sand and magnificent aquamarine waves. Apart from Surfing, Arugam Bay offers a wide variety of holiday activities from snorkeling, diving and kite surfing to simply relaxing by the beach. Wildlife enthusiasts can take an eco boat tour of Pottuvil Lagoon, visit the nearby Kumana Bird Park and Yala National Park or take a speedboat out to the sea in search of dolphins.



Trincomalee

Is a natural deep-water harbor which is famed seaport in the trading history of Sri Lanka. Loved by great explorers such as Marco Polo and Ptolemy, Trincomalee is a pristine paradise, home to the beautiful beaches of Nilaveli and Uppuveli as well as the remarkable gem known as Pigeon Island. A popular whale-watching destination, Trincomalee also offers the stellar surroundings for snorkeling, scuba diving and a range of water sports. In Trincomalee, you will also see Swami Rock (also known as Lovers Leap) a steep drop into the Bay of Bengal and the beautiful Koneswaram Kovil.



Nilaveli

Nilaveli is one of Sri Lanka's most remote and beautiful beaches. Well known for its serene atmosphere, Nilaveli is also a playground for water sports such as snorkeling, scuba diving, and windsurfing. Visitors should also explore the hot water wells and Pigeon Island for a unique Nilaveli experience.



Pasikuda

Pasikuda is famous for its secluded beaches and calm, clear water. This quiet beachside town is relatively untouched, making it the ideal isolated gateway. However, with the dawn of peace, tourism has been booming in Pasikuda, with several new developments in accommodation options and facilities. For a relaxing holiday away from the hustle and bustle, Pasikuda is your dream escape.

An Alternative Option to Sitting on Anchor in the Maldives



460 Nautical Miles East of Maldives is the Republic of Sri Lanka (Ceylon previously). This amazing country offers the Superyacht/Pleasure Yacht and sailing fraternity an option to sit in Galle while yacht awaits owners or charter guest arrivals in the Maldives. Galle in Sri Lanka's Southwest has recently been designated as a Yacht Harbour with marina including a port area consisting of an East/West solid quay wall and two North/South walls.

We have 164 meters East/West and a combination of a 30 meter and an 82 meter North/South option. The quay wall is in good shape with an adequate supply of fresh water and available power. For two days steaming you can finally shut down your generators and give your boat a well-needed washdown without draining valuable yachts water.
